LETTER FROM STAMFORD DOWNTOWN PRESIDENT, DAVID KOORIS

At the start of the New Year, I want to share some things with you all regarding infrastructure in the Downtown. You've probably heard the "I" word in the news a lot over the past year with the Federal passage of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act in late 2021 and the Inflation Reduction Act in 2022 containing many infrastructure and investment provisions. This is all great news for a place like Stamford Downtown as we work to upgrade our infrastructure to accommodate future growth, and do so in a way that acknowledges the severe climate challenges of the 21st Century.

While little of this money is yet flowing to local projects via the State and Federal governments, Stamford isn't sitting around waiting. Over the last year and a bit, both the City of Stamford and Stamford Downtown have been aggressively applying for grants to provide the resources necessary to invest in our transportation infrastructure for the next generation. The last time an investment of this magnitude was made here was in the 1960s and 1970s during the era of Urban Renewal. And while that infrastructure fueled decades of office and housing development, we can recognize now that the designs of the downtown streetscape treated car as king. Changing preferences, amplified by COVID's push to enjoy the outdoors, necessitates new streets that balance the needs of cars, transit, cyclists, and pedestrians.

Over the coming years, the City will be implementing several fully-funded projects that will completely transform Downtown into a more walkable, vibrant, and safer neighborhood. Starting this Spring with the reconstruction of Lower Summer Street to make permanent the outdoor dining scene that has become a hallmark of that corridor these last two summers, several streets will be fully reconstructed including Atlantic Street from Tresser to Broad, Broad Street from Atlantic to Greyrock, and North State Street from Elm to Atlantic. Together, these projects will provide a more inviting gateway to our community from both the train station and I-95 and begin to stitch together Downtown's multiple activity centers and better connect our neighborhood to those that surround. Two additional, fully-funded projects will reimagine the area around Latham Park and the area around the Atlantic/Main Street mall garage ramp.

Infrastructure projects take time and it will be several years before these investments are complete. The concentration of these projects, though, will seemingly transform the neighborhood for the better, overnight.
